

PSAC members all over the country continue to show their determination to fight Canada Post's plan to privatize its call centres and the National Philatelic Centre in Nova Scotia.

Starting March 31, PSAC members distributed flyers in front of Canada Post facilities across the country to inform their colleagues and members of the public of the plan to privatize the call centres and the National Philatelic Centre (NPC).



- PSAC members voiced their opinions in the media and published Letters to the Editor in several newspapers.
- Members of Parliament and local politicians, including Chris Charlton, Meaghan Leslie, Peter Mackay, Roger Cuzner and Bonnie Crombie, were made aware of the negative economic impact of privatizing Canada Post services and they expressed their support for the PSAC campaign.
- Nova Scotia Premier visited Antigonish and publically announced support for the National Philatelic Centre, promising that the province would lobby the federal government.
- Municipalities and towns across the country are passing resolutions against the privatization of Canada Post.
- Postcards explaining the situation are being distributed to citizens in the communities impacted by the announced privatization.
- The Nova Scotia NDP Convention unanimously adopts a resolution in support of the National Philatelic Centre.
- PSAC members made a presentation to Antigonish municipal politicians and the City Council unanimously adopt three resolutions in support of the National Philatelic Centre.
- PSAC members in the National Capital Region collect 700 signatures during the Pride Celebration in Ottawa, on a petition denouncing the privatization at Canada Post. Also in the Capital, members attend the Hot Air Balloon Festival in Gatineau and obtained more signatures on the petition.

## The struggle continues.

Members are collecting signatures at public events and postcards are being distributed to citizens in the communities impacted by the announced privatization.

Your union also prepared a strong case for keeping the Canada Post call centres public and will be submitting it under provisions of the collective agreement that require the employer to consider alternatives.
